Entries Due July 8, 2022

The plans for this year's 18th Annual Kataĥdin Expo Sale are under way and you are invited to consign. KHŚI will be working with LiveAuctions. TV (a division of Superior Livestock) to bring you this sale. LiveAuctions. TV will be handling the webcasting and clerking of the sale. Entries may be made online at www.katahdins.org. Go to Expo tab and look for Entries. The Expo Sale Committee will again be handling the paint branding, body scoring, etc. Please read this article carefully as it contains a great deal of information.

Entry Fee: \$30 per head. All entry fees are due at the time entries are made and are nonrefundable. Your entry is not complete until you have paid your entry fee. Fees should be paid to KHSI via PayPal. You can do this with vour PavPal account or a credit card.

**Entry forms:** Entries may be made online through www.katahdins.org Look for the Expo 2022 tab and select Entries. You will make your payment through KHSI's PayPal account (you can use a credit card on PayPal. For those unable to do online entry you may send your printed form to Operations along with a check for entry fees. Please note on your entry form how consignor's check should be made out, if it is different from your consignor name.


You will be able to enter any weights you wish in the comments section and there is a line to enter your NSIP searchable database link. For those in attendance, there will be a NSIP information sheet available for buyers to pick up.

Substitutions: Substitutions are allowed until August 4, when you turn in your registration papers and health papers, but you still must maintain the correct ram/ewe ratio.

On-line Posting of Pictures: Please post your pictures for your entries no later than **July 8**. Substitutions made later than that date are not guaranteed to have updated pictures available. Post them to Sales@squareoneagrimarketing.com

**Commission:** 10% of the gross price will be deducted from sale price and will go to KHSI.



Live Internet Bidding: LiveAuctions.TV will be providing webcast services that allow the internet buyer, who is unable to attend the sale, to participate during the bidding process in live time. This has broadened our buyer base and has increased our consignors' exposure throughout the country.

**Sale Order:** Rams followed by Ewes.

When consigners check in, they will each be given a scorecard to rank what they feel are the top 10 rams and the top 10 ewes. The Sale Committee will use these rankings to establish the starting sale order for rams and ewes. After the top 10 ranked rams sell, KHSI will sell the remaining rams based on birth date from oldest to voungest. i.e.: Rams 1-10 and then the oldest yearling through the youngest ram lamb. We will then repeat the same procedure with the ewes. General sale order is registered rams, registered ewes, pens of registered ewes, single percentage ewes, and then commercial pens of ewes. Pens are 3 ewes/ewe lambs all in the same age group.

Catalogs: Catalogs will be available online. Scrotal measurements, and body scores will also be posted at the barn. Once sale order has been established, the online catalog will reflect that sale order. Printed sale orders will be available Friday evening.

#### SPECIAL SALE RULES

**Ram/Ewe Ratio:** The maximum number of sheep that may be entered

is 15. A single ram may be sold without an ewe, but to sell a second ram, or any number of additional rams, 2 ewes or a pen of 3 ewes must be consigned per additional ram consigned. Therefore, the ram/ewe ratio is 1 ram/0 ewes; 2 rams/2 ewes or 1 pen of ewes; 3 rams/4 ewes or 2 pens of ewes; 4 rams/6 ewes of 3 pens. There is a limit of 4 rams per consignor.

## Dam Production History

You will need to enter the Dam Production History for each of your consignments.


Dam production record - number born/reared

each year ex. 2/2 = twins born & raised; 3/2 = triplets born & twin raised; 1/1 = single born & raised

#### **NEW**

Reserve bids and information at the sale block: Each consignor will receive a card for each consigned animal to use for placing reserve bids and providing a short amount of information about that animal. Consignors can list up to 2 bullet points or a statement of 25 words or less. This information will be read prior to the sale of that animal. All other information should have been available to potential buyers prior to the sale.

Minimum bid: There will be a minimum bid of \$300 on all registered sheep, unless current market lamb prices require a higher floor bid. Sheep failing to bring the minimum will be a "No Sale".



**Weights:** Optional: Birthweights, 60-day weights, rate of gain can be posted in the comments section of the entry or consigners can post additional information they want displayed at the consigners pens.

#### REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) All ram lambs, including those under 6 mo. of age, are required to have a minimum scrotal circumference of 28 cm, and yearlings are required to have a minimum scrotal circumference of 32cm.
- 2) A **negative** *Brucella Ovis* test is required for all rams over 6 months of age at the time of the sale. If your ram was born before Feb 14, 2022 you need to have a *b. ovis* test that was completed within the 30 days prior to the sale. This must appear on the health paper or be confirmed by documentation from the testing facility.
- 3) **Health Paper Requirements:** (These will be due at Check-in) Papers must be less than 30 days old. You will need 2 copies for

each animal in your consignment. Multiple animals may be listed on the same paper, but you still need to bring enough photocopies to have **2** for each animal. A Federal Scrapie Tag must be in each Health animal's ear.

The following information must be legibly written or typed on all Health Papers.

- 1. Owner or consignor name and address
- 2. Must state that the sheep are consigned to the 2022 Katahdin Expo, Hyder-Burks Ag. Pavilion, 2390 Gainesboro Grade, Tennessee Tech, Cookeville, TN 38501
- 3. Species & purpose of movement (ovine, interstate transfer and sale)
- 4. Private flock tag number
- 5. Federal Scrapie number (must include premise ID and individual tag number)

Note: Both the private flock number and the scrapie tag

#### number must be listed.

- 6. Age, sex, and breed of each animal.
- 7. The following statement must be on the health paper and signed by the issuing veterinarian "Sheep in this shipment are not known to be under movement restrictions due to scrapie."
- 8. Signature and printed name address, and phone number of the accredited veterinarian.

#### It is the consignor's responsibility to ensure the information is complete and legible.

4) Sheep will be checked for soundness in mouths and obvious breeding unsoundness. If found to be unsound, they will not be allowed to sell. It is the breeder's responsibility to check for these problems before bringing the sheep to the sale. Evidence of horns being



- sawed off will be noted on sale order as horned.
- 5) Sheep involved in NSIP will be paint branded with an "N". This indicates that the sheep has NSIP data for those interested in that program.
- 6) Registered sheep cannot be tail docked and must not have C coats. Recorded 87.5% 2022-born ewe lambs may be entered if they are expected to be registerable upon yearling coat inspection. Animals will not be penned that have health problems or show signs of abuse, no KHSI flock ID, no scrapie tag, are inconsistent with their entry application, show signs of coat shearing or clipping, or are females that are within a month of lambing. Commercial ewes may be tail docked.
- 7) DNA Testing: All entries must be either QR or RR at codon 171. This will be posted on the sale order.
  You MUST bring a copy of the test results for each animal. This is KHSI policy.

8) Registration papers: All animals must have a valid, signed registration paper turned in at sale check in. Registration papers are transferred and forwarded to buyers. Cost of transfers will be deducted from consignor settlements.



### AND ALL OTHER OBLIGATIONS OR LIABILITIES.

- 1. Every male and female sold will be guaranteed as a breeder if properly handled. It shall be the responsibility of the buyer to return a nonbreeder to the seller in acceptable breeding condition. The seller, after a fair trial and the animal is found to be a non-breeder, shall have the privilege of replacing the male or female with one of equal value to the satisfaction of the buyer and seller, or refunding the purchase price. This guarantee shall not apply to any animals that are shown after the date of the sale, for the year shown.
- 2. Notification of non-breeder males must be made to the seller prior to January 1st following the sale. Notification of non-breeder females must be made to the seller prior to April 1st following the sale.
- 3. Any animals that drop their lamb teeth prior to 12 months of age as



determined by their registration papers, shall be replaced with an animal of equal quality to the satisfaction of the buyer and seller within a reasonable amount of time, or the consignor shall refund the purchase price of the animal promptly with all fees and percentages levied against such animal retained by the sale. It shall be the responsibility of the buyer to notify the consignor, and they the sale manager, if such a problem occurs. Any consignor failing to comply with this rule shall automatically be barred from consigning any animals to the following sale.

4. Neither the sale managers nor the sponsoring organization can or will assume any responsibility as to the authenticity of the pedigrees, or bloodline information in the sale catalog, on pen cards, or otherwise, and the subsequent genetic performance of any animals purchased. All such information must be adopted at face value. Any special guarantees or claims offered by individual consignors is

- strictly between the consignor and buyer and will not be enforced by the sale management or sponsoring organization.
- 5. This guarantee shall constitute a contract between the buyer and the seller only, and no other parties assume any liability, legal or otherwise, expressed, or implied.

Care and Handling: All sale animals will be handled HUMANELY and with RESPECT. If the KHSI Expo Sale committee/Board of Directors determines that consignors have abused or not handled their sheep with respect, they reserve the right to not allow the animal to sell at THIS sale and the consignor may be banned from the next KHSI Expo Sale.

Consignors are expected to be available to care for their animals each day. You are responsible for their feed, water, etc. until the animal is sold.

**Preparing animals** for exhibit and sale should include washing them at home/ sale facility and hoof trimming. No alterations, clipping or shearing are allowed. Animals should


be used to being handled. Consignors are expected to be available to talk about animals at their pens as much as possible.

You are expected to participate in the preview of animals on Saturday morning.

Animals will be exhibited by class in an arena the morning of the sale so that potential buyers can evaluate them side by side. They may be led by hand or by halter, but all animals must be well controlled. You will need a halter and someone to lead each sheep you have in the class.

#### SALE PROCEDURES

Consignors Meeting: This will be held on Thursday. Time will be posted. Procedures for the sale will be explained and questions answered. All consignors and bidders must have a cell phone #, either their own or their contact person, on file with auction management. They should also list who will be doing the hauling of purchased animals. Mail bids must have cell phone number of contact person.

#### **Payment for Purchases:**

Buyers are expected to pay for their purchases no later than right after the sale. **LiveAuctions.TV** will oversee all aspects of payment. As a courtesy, buyers should be in touch with the seller within an hour of the ending of the sale with plans for transport of the animal or to physically take possession of their purchase

**Non-Payment of Funds:** Buyers that *do not* pay for their purchases will lose their membership rights with KHSI until that payment has been received and cleared.

**Payment to Consignors:** Checks to consignors will be issued no more than 30 days after the sale. Sellers will be assessed a \$1 fee per animal

to cover the new Lamb Check-off requirements. This will be deducted from the consignor's check. (New)

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

Remember, if you are buying sheep online you must have your transportation lined up ahead of the sale. To assist you, KHSI can help you coordinate the transportation. To aid on site buyers as well as online buyers, we are asking anyone willing to haul sheep to their area of the country, to let KHSI Operations know this or contact Jane Smith (765-366-7050) to be added to the haulers list.

Transfer Sheep: Sheep previously sold and being delivered for pick up at the Expo may be housed on the grounds for \$10 per head per day to cover barn rental fee. All sheep in

the transfer barn must have interstate health papers to the destination, even if those sheep are from the same state as the Expo is held. Selling of sheep out of the transfer barn is not allowed, nor is advertising. This space is only offered as convenience for our membership for sheep already sold or leased prior to coming to this event. Individuals selling sheep out of the transfer pens will have membership revoked for one year and not be allowed registry services for that year. # Suggestions for Numbering NSIP Sheep

KHSI and NSIP offer flexibility in the conventions used in identifying animals; to accommodate diverse producer tagging methods. This, however, can lead to buyer confusion when the linkage between the KHSI registration ID and the NSIP ID isn't clear. Worse, it can sometimes lead to an animal being duplicated in the NSIP database with two different IDs and a split data set, reducing accuracy of the GEBVs of that animal, its ancestors and its progeny. If you register sheep with KHSI and participate in NSIP (or think you might someday), KHSI strongly recommends the fol-

lowing conventions for IDs in both systems.

The NSIP is sixteen characters long. The first ten characters are pre-defined as below. The last six characters may be used by the producer at their preference. KHSI would like to standardize on all producers using the last three NSIP digits for the ear tag number; and the preceding three characters as the flock ID (formerly known as the 3-character KHSI "flock prefix").

Then, correspondingly in the KHSI registration and flock ID (ear tag), incorporate at least two digits for the year and use the same three digits

in the flock tag, preceded by the flock ID.

> Acceptable variations on the

convention:

- If you have more than 999 lambs born in a year: shorten the 3-character prefix to two characters, leaving one more digit at the end for the ear tag #.
- If you prefer to use a letter code for the year in the ear tag # instead of a 1- or 2-digit year, place it after the flock ID but before the ear tag # (in place of the YY).
- If you use a word or string length longer than three characters for your KHSI flock ID: find a way to shorten it to three characters such that it's reasonably recognizable and correlates to your flock ID as much as possible.
- Cull or commercial animals may use

## **Reduce Stress** to Prevent **Health Issues**

Growing up in the Appalachian Mountains of southwest Virginia, coal mining was a way of life. In the old days, canaries were placed in the underground mines to detect carbon monoxide. As a result, the phrase "canary in the coal mine" became a term that signaled an early warning of impending danger. This article will discuss the importance of our canary in sheep production, bottle jaw. Regardless of the underlying cause, any incidence of bottle jaw must be investigated.

Bottle jaw is not a disease, but rather a symptom of any one of several possible health conditions. The term refers to a soft pendulous fluid swelling between the jaw bones. It should not be confused with lamb goiter, or the development of a fat pad at the throat latch in Katahdins, which is a sign of growth and perfect health. In bottle jaw, the fluid portion of the blood, or serum, leaks out of the vessels and collects in the tissue, usually in the lowest areas of the body, forming a pocket. In order for this to occur, blood must become thin and watery, and resembles "cherry Koolaid" instead of thick normal blood. The reasons for this change in blood thickness are the rest of our story.

Red blood cells and proteins are mixed throughout the watery serum to give whole blood its appearance. Anytime that an animal loses protein, or becomes anemic, symptoms appear. It is important to consider other factors such as FAMACHA scores, fecal egg counts, time of year, and

previous treatments before determining a diagnosis. Barber pole worms are by far the most common cause of anemia and loss of blood protein in grazing sheep. By the time bottle jaw appears, changes in the blood are probably dangerously severe. If parasitism is the cause, eye membranes should be pale to white, manure will be loose, and fecal counts will be high. Most often, this happens in the warm, grazing months, usually after periods of generous rainfall. The absence of pale membranes should immediately signal to look for other causes.

Bottle jaw is also common in animals with chronic diarrhea, where blood proteins leak through the gut wall and are excreted. Dirty tails and thin body conditions are indicators in these animals. Coccidiosis seems to be very prevalent in the Katahdin breed, especially in hot summer weather. Treatment on a flock or individual basis may make symptoms disappear. Dietary imbalances such rations with too little roughage can also cause diarrhea and protein loss. Johne's Disease is another infectious cause of chronic dysentery and must be ruled out before treatment. Mineral imbalances and toxicities can cause the death of red blood cells and anemia, and lead to formation of bottle jaw. I have also seen, on several occasions, sheep who are starved for salt or mineral, and suddenly provided with it, overindulge on salt and develop bottle jaw due to the osmotic effect of salt in the intestine and blood stream.

In summary, while parasitism is by far the most common reason for anemia and bottle jaw, there are several other reasons that this symptom occurs. A well-balanced nutritional

program, combined with a constant supply of high quality mineral, and attention to mucous membrane color should keep your sheep healthy. Testing for worm eggs in feces, and for other infectious diseases will help with diagnosis of underlying disease. Waiting until the canary stops singing may be too late.

only a fence line between them and their mothers reduces stress

and keeps them healthy. If lambs will eventually be moved to another location, wean them first for a couple weeks at the original farm, before transporting.

Physical factors also play an important role in stress levels. Extreme heat and cold play a profound effect on immunity, making the importance of shelter during winter, and shade during summer a primary focus. Often food intake, and rumination (digestion) is decreased during extreme climate conditions, which also lowers the ability to fight off disease. Poor sanitation, manure, and mud also create conditions that are likely to cause disease. Clean, well-bedded barns and loafing areas encourage comfortable resting and increased health. The presence of roughage such as high quality pasture or blade hay encourages sheep to eat, keeps the rumen working, and reduces diarrhea. Keeping the digestive system calm and functioning during periods of stress is extremely important. Probiotics may be helpful here to add healthy bacterial back into the digestive tract.

Gradual dietary changes, with high roughage and low grain portions will help reduce incidence. Offering your sheep clean areas to eat and rest, clean, fresh water and shade and shelter from harsh environmental conditions will help. Don't wean, haul, or work sheep on extremely hot or cold days if possible. The success of your operation depends on the production of healthy sheep. Attention to reducing the stress factors discussed here will prevent reduction of immunity and occurrence of disease, and in turn, and increase in your profitability and

happiness.

# Here's How I do It: Time to Talk Tags!

Tagging lambs is a common task for many of us, but it wasn't for me until about 10 years ago; and the following is part of my tagging story. Up until 2013 I had never tagged an animal. I had tattooed the ears of my New Zealand White rabbits many years ago, but I had never tagged a sheep or any other critter. Let's get it out of the way right up front - "tug" and "tagged" are both verbs, and I'm more a fan of using "tug", but the correct English just might be "tagged". Feel free to write a letter to the editor if you have input on this. Anyway, back to tagging sheep. We had a few sheep that we could recognize and a bunch that just blended in with the flock, and we had no idea who they were or how old they were. I tried doing some tagging on some ewes that I bought in 2013, with tags and a tagger that I had bought at an auction. When I punched the first ewe's ear and she reared back from it, the main part of the tag fell off and only a round button remained in her ear. I discovered that the old cow tags that I had bought were dry rotted beyond usefulness. The other 4 ewes were released without tags and I now had one more sheep that I knew by name - Buttons.


We had bought the farm by this time and had decided to turn it into a sheep farm, and I had learned that it would be important to keep records on our animals so tagging them would be a requirement. We knew nothing about tagging conventions, but we did get a couple hundred free scrapie tags and a free applicator (tagger). To do this, we contacted the USDA scrapie hotline at 866-873-2824. If you don't know anything about scrapie tags, please call this number and get set up. I think a starter quantity of tags are still free, but they charge for the applicator now. We got set up with our own farm number, free tags and a tagger. We were an officially recognized sheep farm! We decided to use the scrapie tags on all of our lambs born in 2014 and we tagged all of the other animals with a very basic and cheap Q-Flex 1.5 from Premier1, starting with 001 and working up to about 040. The first year we used white tags, and we knew that any animals with a scrapie tag was born in 2014 and any with a white, 3-digit Q-Flex tag was born in 2013 or earlier. We had started our tagging system in a very humble way, and everyone born before 2014 was given a birth year of 2013 in our records.

The next year we bought the same style of tags but in yellow, so all lambs born in 2015 were tagged with a yellow, 3-digit tag; again starting at 001 and working up. This all sounds very organized, but it was anything but. We were lambing in the fields, and we were not tagging until weekends. I had written about this before that we were spray painting colored dots, dashes and triangles on newborn lambs as well as their mothers... when we could catch them. We tried to read the ear tag # of the dam and record the encrypted paint marks to the dam's tag #. We spent hours in the fields sitting in the golf cart with binoculars to get tag #s. We actually tried painting the tag # on the side of the ewes, when we could catch them, in big font so we could read it from a distance, or at least describe what the scribble looked like. Not all of our notes cor-

related when it came to the weekend tagging ritual. We would tag all of the lambs and spend more hours in the golf cart watching for ewes and lambs to settle together and then trying to read their tag numbers. And don't be fooled, just because a dam is nursing a lamb, it doesn't mean that she gave birth to it. Our idealistic thoughts of having our flock neatly documented and catalogued were quickly becoming a frustrating fantasy. It seemed like every time we weighed, vaccinated or otherwise handled

the group, there were a few lambs that came up with missing tags... ugh. We would document their weights or vaccinate them, put in a new tag, then again sit and watch for which ewe they teamed up with. Plus, the 3-digit tags got confusing as to which way we read them. Was it 001 or 100, 060 or 090? We were fooled a few times by reading tags upside down. Somehow, and it happens to this day, there were also a few lambs tagged with one number on top and another number on the bottom. Jan would tell me to grab 147 and I would let it run by because I was seeing 146 until it passed by me. Yeah, try to get the same number on both sides of the ear - and don't tell me that never happened to you.

By our second year we had also devised a tagging code for ewes and rams. Rams were tagged in the right ear and ewes in the left. This is a very handy way to quickly pick out the rams from the ewes. And if there is



one thing worse than tagging a lamb with 2 different numbers, it is tagging a ram as a ewe and not realizing it until after he has bred 60% of your flock. We will never forget the very happy but infamous - Y5 (Yellow 005). We now check the sex of our lambs every time they come through the chute and one last time at weaning.

In our third year of tagging, we decided to go with a larger, Lime Green tag that could not be mistakenly read backwards and that we could read from a greater distance. We were not ready to start putting the larger tags on the newborn lambs, so we purchased the small brass tags and pliers so we could identify our lambs from the day they were born. We felt that this would not hurt their ears, and we would wait until the lambs were bigger to put in their flock tags. This helped, but some of the ears became infected as the ear grew around the tag. Our plan to use the brass tags as a permanent ID was shot, as I eventually removed all of them due to infections. We replaced the brass tags with left-over white and yellow tags as a "backup" tag in case the larger permanent tag came out. The permanent tags were the Q-Flex 3 tags which allowed us to put our farm initials (ELR) on the top row and then the lamb number on the bottom. This gave our animals a more professional look and made it easier for us to read their tags from a distance.

The next year we changed from the brass tags to the Mini-tags when we tagged newborn lambs. These are cute little tags for lambs. They got their lamb tag in one ear and at about 4 weeks old they got a Purple Q-Flex 3 as their forever flock tag. Our software system allowed us to use the one tag as their flock ID, and the other tag as a backup tag. We also changed the color of the larger tag so we could easily tell what year the animal was born. That worked pretty well, but there is always a learning experience, and we learned that not every color of tag is easy to read over time. Not only is it the color of the tag, but the way that the information is printed on the tag affects the ability to read a tag. The new way of printing tags is to use a

laser and this can be almost non readable over a period of time on certain color tags. The manufacturers know this and some will tell you which color tags are the most readable. The one batch of tags we purchased were laser etched and the numbers were basically gray instead of black, which was difficult to read. On the Premier1 website, they list the tag colors in the order of readability: Yellow, White, Spearmint, Salmon, Pink, Lime Green, Black, Blue, and on down until you get to Purple and Orange. The Purple was so hard to read that Jan ended up writing over many of the tags with an ink tag marker, while I tried to hold their heads still. That is not recommended as it is next to impossible, but almost necessary. We actually traced over every number on every tag this year with the ink marker, as the numbers on the new tags came in gray from being laser etched and not printed. If this bothers you, and it should, you may want to check on this with your tag supplier before you

Join us on Facebook: Leslie Raber order from them. We will likely never order laser "printed" tags again. A few colors work OK with laser, but many do not.

The next year we changed the whole system to using Shearwell EID tags. These are really nice, 1-piece, loop ear tags. We got yellow tags with the RFID chip and the complementary blue tags without. The yellow was a permanent tag and were also our scrapie tags. The blue had the same number but were not RFID or scrapie. We put the yellow in the left and the blue in the right ear of the ewes, and yellow in the right and blue in the left ear of the ram lambs. And as usual, we learned something that needed to change for the next year. The Shearwell tags can only be read visually from about 12" away while the animal is completely still. This meant to find any specific lamb, we had to scan them or restrain them, spit on the tag to clean it off, then carefully read it. I also tried to take photos of their tags while they were eating so I could read the number from my phone. The Shearwell system was a great move for us, but I'll never use only their tags again.

In 2019 we decided to use the Shearwell yellow RFID tag in the left ear of the ewe and right ear of the rams. We also bought Q-Flex 3 tags so we would have the EID tag in one ear and a readable flock tag in the other. Life was

getting better, though we somehow picked orange flock tags... the only color below purple on the readability chart! Out came the ink pen again. After 2019 we liked where we were going, especially after we found the readability chart with the help of a conversation with Premier1 folks, and we decided

to keep up this system, though using readable tags. In 2020 we started over again with White tags, and then Yellow in 2021 followed by Pink in 2022, and Spearmint is on deck for 2023. Using a color scheme like this allows us to quickly identify the age of an animal, without reading the tag. We also keep a small stock of blank Q-Flex 5 tags of different colors so we can easily create an appropriate tag if one gets lost. I recommend replacing a lost tag as soon as possible because you do not want to have a sheep

without either tag. Playing the game of "who is she" is not fun when it is through the process of elimination

of hundreds of ewes. Check for 2 tags every time they come through the chute and make sure they have 2 tags when they leave the chute.


We have found that tagging day-old lambs with a Shearwell tag in one ear and

a Q-Flex 3 tag in the other does not seem to cause any problems to the animal and it makes our lives much better. This helps us to identify a lamb from a distance if we hear it cough or see it by itself or whatever. We use the Shearwell for scrapie tags and the flock tag has ELR on the top row and 4 or 5 digits on the bottom row for identification. The first digit or two corresponds to the animal's birth year, and the last 3 digits are the lamb's birth order, starting with 001. Jan and I differ on this, as I only want 4 digits and she likes 5... so our tags will likely always have 5 digits. I just want the best readability from a distance. To further understand this tagging convention, the KHSI NSIP Committee, well mostly Michelle Canfield, has recently developed a document that provides a good protocol to use when ordering the ear tags, and it can be found elsewhere in this issue. Using this recommended protocol for tagging and registration will help provide a bit of familiarity and uniformity across the breed.

Tag readability is affected by the color, print type and size of the tag; as well as on the tag's placement on the ear. We always put the loop tag on the front half of the ear which helps keep them from getting caught on the fence as they walk past. But I like to put the flock tag to the back half of the ear so it hangs down just a bit. It is frustrating when a sheep looks right

at you and the tag is hidden by the ear. And another thing, I like to put the "button" side of the tag "inside" the ear so it is not getting caught on things. That means that the needle side of the applicator is on the outside of the ear. There are many online resources for the technical aspects of proper tag placement, and it is generally accepted to be about 1/3 to ½ of the ear's length from the head, and placed above or below the vein that runs through the middle, though I like below. Another thing we do when we tag is to smear some antiseptic

SuperLube on the male point of every tag just before tagging. We buy the blue stuff which is pretty thick in the wintertime and mix it with a clear lube product I get from a dairy supply store. I also throw away the flip top with the little dispensing hole that comes from the manufacturer and I use ones that I found with a much larger, rectangular opening. If you need any of the better cap nozzles, just drop me a note. Better yet, we

should complain to the SuperLube people; have they ever tried to use this stuff in winter? I like to have one of the refillable 8-ounce bottles in our tagging tray so it is handy and easily fits in my pocket if needed.

As a side note, in addition to scrapie tags, flock tags and EID tags, there are also insecticide ear tags which are labeled for use on cattle. I've not used them, but I saw the bright red tags on sheep and when I asked about them, I was told they can be used on sheep

in consultation with a veterinarian. Just like using any drug or insecticide off label, these tags need veterinarian approval for use on sheep. It would be great if such a product was approved for sheep to deter flies, mosquitos, nasal bots, and all sorts of bothersome insects. Until then, consult your vet.



## KHSI 2022 Board of Director Candidates


KATHY BIELEK - WOOSTER, OHIO My name is Kathy Bielek and I am running for the KHSI Board of Directors. My husband, Jeff, and I operate Misty Oaks Farm comprised of a small flock of registered Katahdins in Wooster, Ohio. We began our life in sheep in 2000 when we decided to diversify our Certified Tree Farm with the addition of sheep. Shortly thereafter, we heard Dr. Charles Parker, sheep specialist and Professor emeritus, Ohio State University, speak at our local sheep banquet about the importance to the sheep industry of easy care, "pounds of quality lamb weaned per ewe" and parasite resistance. He claimed that Katahdins were the breed of the future and talked of their many virtues. We were sold on the breed and bought our first Katahdins two months later. Following Dr. Parker's vision, we immediately started keeping performance records and joined the National Sheep Improvement Program (NSIP) in 2005.

One of the attractions for Katahdins was their parasite resistance. The standard advice at that time was to deworm every animal every 30 days. I was the program assistant for the organic farming program at Ohio State University's Wooster Campus (formerly the Ohio Agriculture Research & Dévelopment Center or OARDC) and didn't like the thought of all those chemicals and the labor that went with deworming monthly. We were lucky to attend the KHSI Expo in Maine in 2003 and to participate in one of the first FAMACHA training classes in the US. Selective deworming made so much sense, but it was revolutionary at the time. We obtained a small grant through OSU in 2004 to try selective deworming on our flock. Dr. William Shulaw, OSU Veterinary Preventative Medicine, and Dr. Charles Parker graciously agreed to act as mentors. Following that grant I applied for and received four additional grants over the next eight years through the Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (SARE) program to build on and expand our understanding of parasites and selection for parasite resistance both in lambs and in periparturient ewes, working with multiple other Katahdin flocks. I was very fortunate to be able to work under Dr.

Joan Burke, USDA ARS, on several of her parasite projects over the years, including the organic OREI project that served to develop the reference population of Katahdins that made the genomics project possible. We are currently submitting data through the Sheep GEMS project.

Education is one of my passions, through mentoring new producers, providing continuing education programs, sharing research results and especially getting young people involved in the sheep industry. Growing up, I was a member of 4H for 10 years, showing my horses and dog. I firmly believe in the value of programs such as 4H and FFA in molding our youth and exposing them to the sheep industry. Each of my SARE grants had a youth component where each farm was encouraged to hire a 4H or FFA student to assist with data collection and animal handling. Every year I continue to work with at least one local youth to expose them to the various aspects of shepherding.

We have been members of the

Ohio Sheep Improvement Association (OSIA) for 20 years and I have served on the OSIA Board of Trustees for nine years. I've served on the planning committees of OSIA's two annual educational events, the Buckeye Shepherds Symposium and Ohio Sheep Day, for 10 years and have been co-chair of the Symposium planning committee for nine years. I was active in our local sheep organization (Ohio Heartland Sheep Improvement Association) from 2001 until the group

disbanded in 2019, serving as president of the group for six of those years. In 2020 I was asked to help organize a new regional Katahdin group, the Eastern Alliance for Production Katahdins. I have served as secretary for the group's board of directors since its beginning and co-chair the Communications committee which produces a quarterly newsletter, educational material and blogs for the website.



My strong belief in the economic future of the Katahdin breed has led me to become a long time member of sev-




have primarily been responsible for the promotion of the Katahdin breed at various educational and sale events in various states.



## Katahdin Recipe Forum-Part 1

## Lamb Sliders with Herby Yogurt Sauce and Roasted Peppers

Recipe provided by the American Lamb Board (https://www.americanlamb.com/recipes-2/)

#### **INGREDIENTS**

#### FOR THE ROASTED PEPPERS & ONIONS

- 2 large green bell peppers, thinly sliced
- 1/2 a large red onion, thinly sliced
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- salt
- pepper

#### FOR THE HERBY YOGURT SAUCE

- 1 cup Greek yogurt
- 2 large handfuls fresh parsley
- 1 large lemon, zested and juiced
- 1-2 tbsp olive oil
- salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste
- 1/4 tsp oregano

## FOR THE LAMB SLIDER PATTIES

- 1 lb ground American lamb
- 4 large cloves garlic
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tbsp olive oil

#### **FOR SERVING**

- brioche buns, togsted
- lettuce or arugula

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Make the Herb Yogurt Sauce: Add all yogurt sauce ingredients to your food processor and pulse to combine. Add a bit more olive oil as needed to help it come together. Pop this into the fridge until ready to serve.
- 2. Roast the Peppers & Onions: Preheat your oven to 425° F. Toss the peppers, onions, olive oil, salt, and pepper together well on a large baking sheet. Roast for 18-24 minutes, turning halfway through, until roasty and tender. Set aside.
- 3. Make the lamb patties: While your veggies are roasting, start the lamb sliders. Combine the lamb meat, garlic, spices, and olive oil in a bowl and gently stir to combine. Don't overmix. Divide this mixture into 8-10 small patties, flattening them just a bit. Heat a skillet over medium heat, and cook the patties in batches, about 2-3 minutes per side (or cook on the grill with heat held at 350° F). Use a lid over your pan to help contain the heat so the patties cook through in the middle. Use a meat thermometer to check for doneness. USDA recommends that ground lamb reaches an internal temperature of 160° F.

Serve+ Store: Assemble your sliders - add a handful of greens to a toasted bun, then add a slider patty, a spoonful of the yogurt sauce, and top with the roasted veggies. Dig in!

Store leftover slider patties in an airtight container in the fridge for 3-4 days.

## Katahdin Recipe Forum-Part 2

## **Mediterranean Roasted Leg of Lamb**

Recipe provided by the American Lamb Board (https://www.americanlamb.com/recipes-2/)

#### **INGREDIENTS**

7-9 pound bone-in American leg of lamb (see recipe notes for boneless)

#### MARINADE

4 sprigs of fresh rosemary 15 cloves of garlic

6 teaspoons kosher salt (half the amount for other salts)

2 teaspoons black pepper 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 2 teaspoons ground sumac 3 Tablespoons za'atar spice

2 Tablespoons pomegranate molasses 1/3 cup olive oil

AROMATICS PAN DRIPPINGS GRAVY

2 large onions, sliced 4 Tablespoons flour

2 lemons, halved Additional salt and pepper as needed

2 whole heads of garlic, top trimmed Water as needed

2 cups beef broth

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Begin by preparing your marinade mixture at least 12 hours before cooking your lamb.
- 2. In the bowl of a food processor or blender, place all your marinade ingredients and blend until a paste forms.
- 3. Next, begin preparing your lamb by removing any twine or netting and place fat side up.
- 4. With a sharp knife, make ½" inch diagonal cuts across the fat. Diagonals should be spaced about 1" apart. After initial diagonals are cut, go the other direction to create a diamond pattern on the top of your lamb. Flip your lamb over and repeat the process on the other side, insert knife ½" inch (or as far as you can until you hit bone).
- 5. Once you have made inserts into your lamb, rub the marinade all over the lamb, ensuring you are getting it inside the slits. This will help to season the lamb entirely. Place in a food safe bag or cover and refrigerate for at least 12 hours up to 48.
- 6. When you are ready to cook your lamb, remove from the refrigerator and allow it to come to room temperature for about 30 minutes.
- 7. Preheat oven to 325° Fahrenheit (162° C)\*.
- 8. While your lamb is resting, prepare your aromatics. Line a large roasting pan with foil, then insert the roasting rack. Add your onions, lemons and garlic to the bottom of the roasting pan. Pour in your 2 cups of broth around the aromatics. Place your marinated lamb on the rack and cover tightly with foil. Place in the oven with the oven rack centered.
- 9. Cook for 4-4.5 hours for a 7 pound bone-in leg. You can calculate your time at 35-40 minutes/pound.
- 10. After 4-4.5 hours of cook time, remove the foil and brown the top if it has not already browned and crisped, cook for another 15 minutes. Internal temperature should read about 200°-205° (96° C).
- 11. Remove from the roasting rack onto a platter and allow to rest for 15-20 minutes.

#### Pan Drippings Gravy

- While your lamb is resting, remove any excess fat from your roasting pan.
- Place your roasting pan on your stovetop burner and allow to heat, whisk in 4 tablespoons of flour. Continue whisking until no lumps remain and sauce begins to thicken.
- If your sauce is too thick, add  $\frac{1}{2}$  1 cup water and continue to whisking until you have a gravy consistency.
- Strain through a sieve and season with any additional salt or pepper, serve with your lamb

**Notes:** USDA recommends lamb be cooked to an internal temperature of 145° F with a 3 minute rest.

This recipe creates a pull apart style lamb, very tender and flaky requiring only tongs to serve. If you are wanting sliced lamb, you'll want adjust your timing and temperature: Sliced lamb - 350° F for 15-20 minutes per pound, internal temperature of 135° F

If you are using a boneless leg of lamb, make sure your leg is butterflied. Rub the marinade all over your lamb ensuring the inside is seasoned well and then wrap using butcher twine. Boneless legs of lamb are usually smaller in size, about 4-5 pounds. You'll want to roast for 35 minutes per pound at the same 325° temperature. Sliced boneless leg of lamb - 350° F for 25 minutes per pound, internal temperature of 135° F
